Sponsored Walk

In the summer four of us from St Andrew's Ham Mothers' Union, completed a 10 mile sponsored walk around Richmond Park. This was to raise money both for the MU Summer of Hope Appeal and to support our local (Richmond) domestic abuse refuge, as part of our RISE UP campaign.

Between St Andrew's, our own church, and two local churches, St Richard's and St Peter's, whose congregations also supported us, we raised £1565!





Before the walk I was in touch with

Katie Drew, of the Melanesian Mission, who had asked if we could raise £900 to pay for 10 sewing machines to send to the Solomon Islands. We have achieved that goal. I attach the information she sent us about the sewing workshops that the Mothers' Union are supporting in the Solomon Islands. The rest of the money will be divided between the main Summer of Hope Appeal and paying for the "moving in" packages and other resources for the women taking shelter in our local Richmond domestic abuse refuge. We are hoping that Katie will be able to come to St Andrew's to receive the cheque in person.



Sr Veronica, from the Community of the Sisters of the Church in the Solomon Islands, has a long-standing connection with St Andrew's and has said how much she values the work of the Mothers' Union in the Solomon Islands. She will be visiting us on 7th September.

SUMMER OF HOPE CREAM TEA

On Saturday 9th August (Mary Sumner Day - the founder of the Mothers' Union) a cream tea was held in St Barnabas Church Halls, Sutton in aid of the Mothers' Union "Summer of Hope" Appeal for the women in the war torn Democratic Republic of Congo. Women are forever having to flee their homes with nothing but their children and a handful of seeds. The Mothers' Union Literacy and Development Scheme, helps them survive, grow food, learn to read and be numerate, build businesses and raise families in faith.

About 40 people, including members from St John's, Belmont, St Oswald's, Cheam and St Nicholas, Sutton Mothers' Union branches joined St Barnabas Branch members for the cream tea.

The afternoon began with an account of how Mary Sumner started the Mothers' Union and what it does today, plus details of its work in the Democratic Republic of Congo.

The cream tea was laid out on tables with scones, clotted cream, tea, milk and a variety of 4 different homemade jams. There was colouring and sewing, MU seeds to plant and balloons for the children. The afternoon ended with a free picture bingo game. £378.60 was raised for the "Summer of Hope" Appeal.

Members' Meeting 11th October 2025

The Members' Meeting held at St Andrew's Church, Ham in the Kingston Area was preceded by a short act of worship led by the Vicar, the Revd Alice Pettit. She has kindly given her permission for her homily to be included in MU Southwark News.



Today we commemorate Ethelburga, who in the 7th Century, was born into wealthy family with connections. She was the sister of Erconwald, the Bishop of London. She became abbess of the double monastery at Barking (a religious house for both men and women, with a common superior). The double monasterv maintained segregation of the sexes, but it also allowed for the sharing of resources for worship and protection from external forces. Ethelburga joined the monastery at an early age, and in the time of her stay, Barking became celebrated for the fervour of the nuns in both faith and study.

Bede, writing 70 years after her death, wrote about her and honoured her for her holy lifestyle as well as for the miracles that surrounded her life. Bede noted that 'none who knew her holy life can doubt that when she departed this life the gates of her heavenly home opened at her coming'.

May the same be said of us!

Season of Creation - Autumn

Autumn is usually considered to be the precursor of winter. Well, perhaps it is by the time it gets to December, but really, just think about how the world looked at the beginning of Autumn: brilliant colours in trees everywhere, song birds swooping around and the grass still needing mowing. Even the sweet peas were still in full flower.

I was brought up in deepest Hampshire where I had to walk a mile through (often muddy)fields of cows or corn or grass depending on the rotation, to reach the bus stop for school. In those days, Harvest Festival was normally held once the harvest was in which could be as early as mid-September. Arriving in London to go to university was quite a shock as in the local churches the festival was always held on the first Sunday in October ... much too late in my opinion! But now I can understand as Harvest Festival falls at the end of the Season of Creation, dedicated to God the Creator and Sustainer of all life, when we have learned during the previous four weeks about God's wonderful creation because of his love for us. We have learned to honour him for his wonderful works, and we have learned how woefully we have fallen short in caring for his creation. This year the theme was Peace in Creation: Creation will find peace when justice is restored. Justice equates to our treatment of people and the environment: We need to love our neighbour as ourselves, both human and the world around us, .

During our recent holiday in Switzerland Anthony and I were frequently brought up short on our walks, by finding brass plaques

rivetted into stones. These plaques had a verse of praise to God – often from the psalms - followed by a short interpretation. Would that they could be found here too, so that there would be constant written reminders of God's goodness to us!

I finish with pictures of two of these plaques and the prayer which we have had at the end of each of our creationtide services



Come and see what the Lord has done: he is awesome in his deeds among mortals. Psalm 66:5

In the beauty of nature we see God's outstretched hand. He wants to love his children home.

Everything that has breath, praise the Lord! Psalm 150:6

Our land with its splendour, its mountains, its fields, are the witnesses of your power, the traces of your fatherly goodness. Everything in us worships you: you have done great things for us.



Create in us a new heart and a new vision, O God, that the gifts of your Spirit may work in us and renew the face of the earth..

May we be one with you so that our work is yours and your work is ours.

Lead us to transform our lives to reflect your glory in Creation; through Jesus Christ our Saviour, who is alive with you and the holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen
